

TRY AN M-10 Bill Schultz

I had my first ride of the season and rode my sled 800 miles. Normally my first ride is half or less miles and I come home with an aching back from the jolts caused by hitting bad bumps on the trail and sore leg muscles from raising myself off the seat to try and avoid the jolts. This year my back did not ache and my legs were not sore because I put an M-10 suspension in my sled.

In past years I rode with a fellow who had an M-10. He never said anything about the ride so I did not acquire any interest. Last year Ron Pasbrig had a sled with an M-10 and kept talking about how great the ride was. At one point we stopped after riding a rough trail and Ron was good enough to let me try his sled over the bumps. It was a world of difference. I hated to give the sled back to Ron.

If you are on a ride with someone who has an M-10 suspension in their sled, ask them to let you try it. I am sure you will want one for your sled.

The price for the M-10 suspension, including the mounting kit needed so the unit fits your sled, starts at \$999.99. If this price seems high, just remember that it can go from sled to sled. The suspensions come in red, green, blue, black, yellow or purple to match your sled color. If your dealer is not familiar with the M-10, I'm sure if you call Fast, Inc. at 218-744-2101 they will tell you what is best for your type of riding and how you can purchase one. Best thing I did this year for snowmobiling!

Do ride a sled with an M-10 suspension. I am sure you will want one for your sled and you will agree it was the best thing you did!

Northern Minnesota Tour February 9th - 16th, 2003

We will snowmobile on fantastic trails with beautiful scenery and also many places to see and tour. Last year lots of snowmobilers signed up, but no snow cancelled the trip. There will be groups of different speeds or bring your own group.

- Sunday: Trailer to Grand Rapids, MN (Approx. 475 miles) Stay at Sawmill Inn.
- Monday: Tour Itasca State Park, See headwaters (beginning) of the Mississippi River. Stay at Super 8 in Fosston, MN.
- **Tuesday:** Tour Digi-Key Corp., largest distributor of electronic components, lunch at Black Cat Sports Bar and Grill, displaying 40 years of Arctic memorabilia, tour Arctic Cat plant, stay at Best Western, Thief River Falls, MN.
- **Wednesday:** Tour Polaris factory, lunch at Brenigan's, which adjoins the Polaris Experience museum. Stay at Can-Am Motel in Warroad, MN.
- **Thursday:** Marvin Windows are made in Warroad. The city is famous for the manufacturing of ice hockey sticks, especially for the Olympics. Tours available for both factories. Tour Lake of the Woods, which has a city of ice fishing shacks, some very elaborate. Stay at Day's Inn in International Falls, MN.
- **Friday:** Ride to Kettle Falls on the 34-mile Rainy Lake Trail, see the Falls and the famous Kettle Falls Hotel, built 1913. More lake riding to Crane Lake for lunch. All lake trails are well marked and safe. Stay at Fortune Bay Resort and Casino in Tower, MN.
- Saturday: Ride back to Grand Rapids viewing the Hull Rust Mahoning Mine (largest open pit mine, 3 miles long, 600 feet deep). Cross Powers Bridge, longest bridge in MN.

Sunday: trailer home.

Gamblers will find casinos accessible by sled at Thief River Falls, Warroad and Tower.

The car ride to Thessalon, Canada from Milwaukee is 9.5 hours. Rooms average out at \$75.00 plus \$9.00 tax CDN for two people or \$50.40 USA or \$25.20 USA per person per night. Food in Canada when you exchange the money is equal to USA. One liter of gas is 79.3 cents which comes out to \$1.80 USA per gallon. Seven-day trail permit \$100 CDN, \$60.00 USA.
